THE TURTLE'S JOURNEY

Papahānaumokuākea provides almost all the nesting grounds for the Hawaiian green sea turtle (or honu in Hawaiian). To lay their eggs, they swim 500–800 miles from their feeding grounds in the main Hawaiian Islands to the nesting beaches in the Northwestern Hawaiian Islands. This whole journey takes about 30 days.

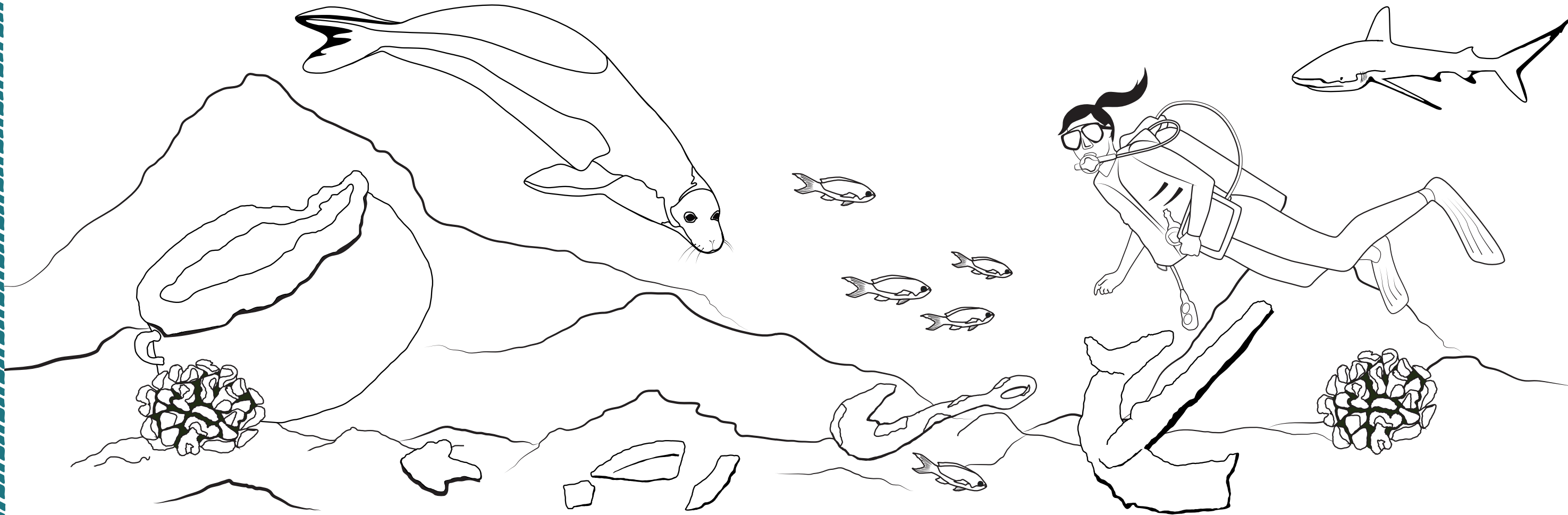

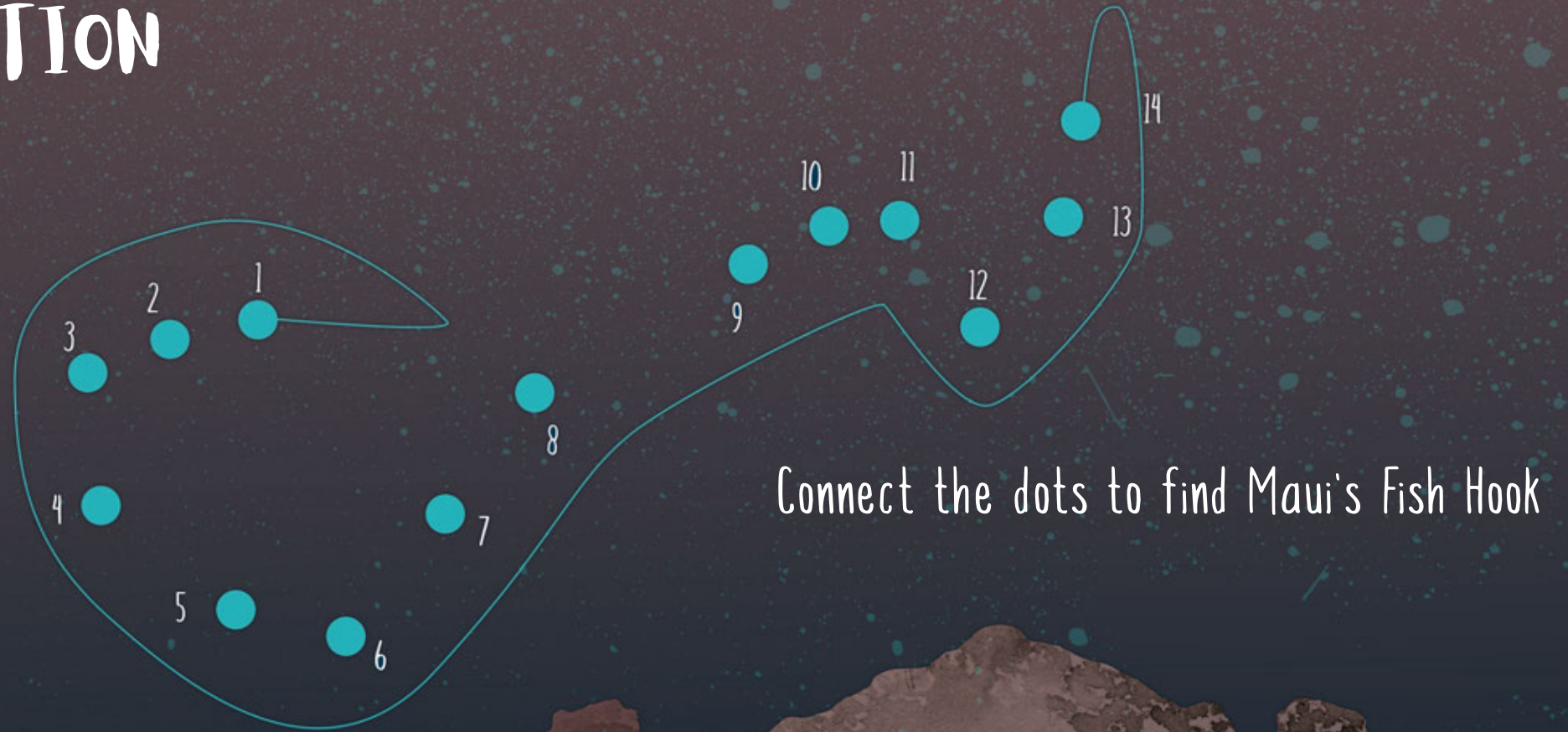

DEEP SEA DIVERS



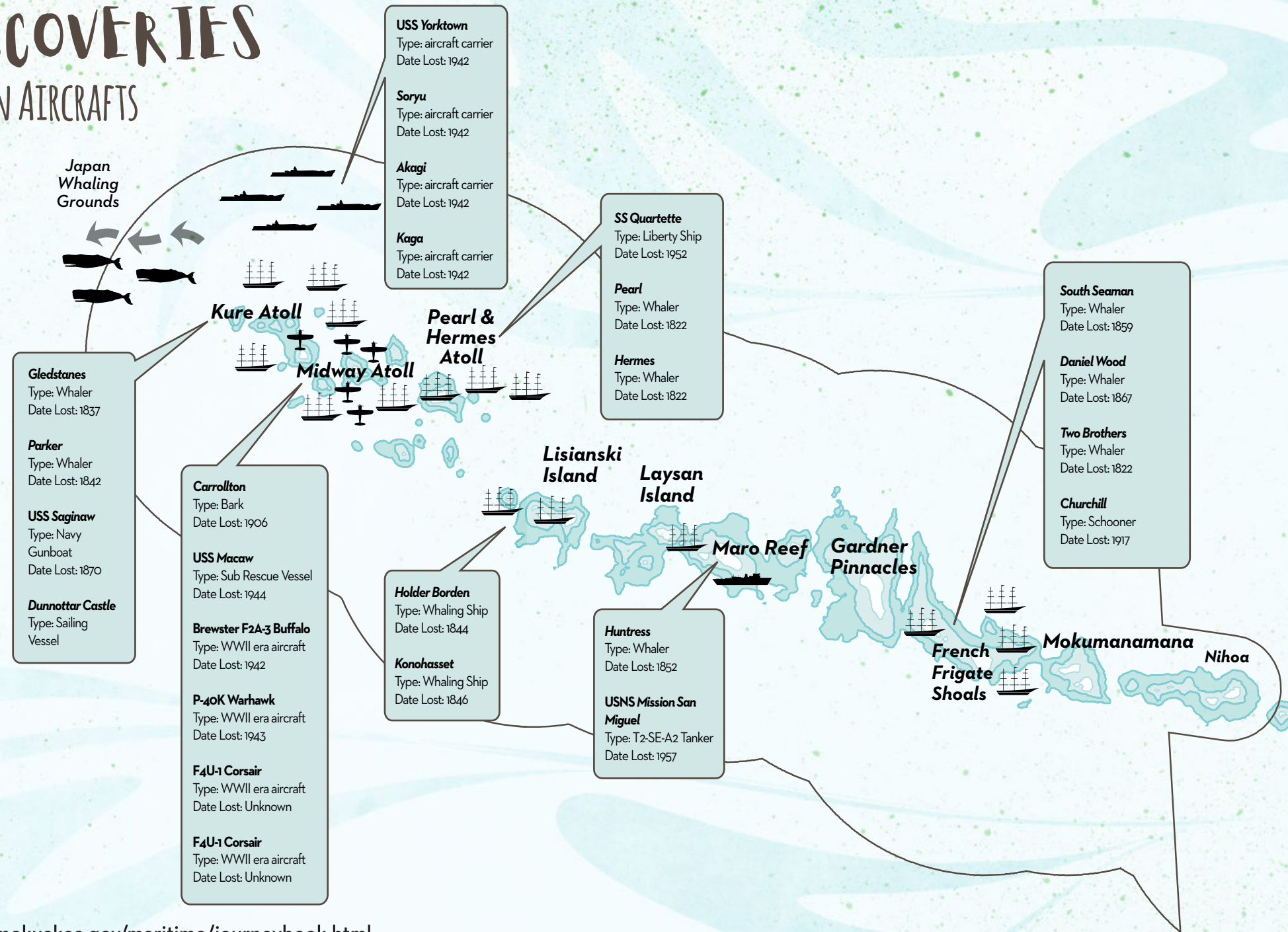
Monk seals are only found in Hawaii. They can dive as deep as 1,550 ft and can hold their breath for as long as 20 minutes.

Papahānaumokuākea is home to humpback whales in the winter. They dive up to 600 ft and can stay under water for 30 minutes.
